AKC hands out lifetime suspension to couple convicted of cruelty

The American Kennel Club's board of directors has barred collie breeders Jon and Athena Harman from registering dogs or entering dogs in AKC shows. The AKC ordinarily suspends breeders convicted of animal cruelty for 10 years and fines them \$2,000.

But because of the number of dogs involved "and the horrific conditions these dogs were made to endure," the organization's Management Disciplinary Committee recommended a lifetime suspension for the Harmans. The AKC governs all reputable dog shows and its stamp of approval is considered essential to American breeders.

At the same time it handed out the suspensions, the board reduced its usual \$2,000 fine for convicted animal abusers to \$1,000 in the Harmans' case.

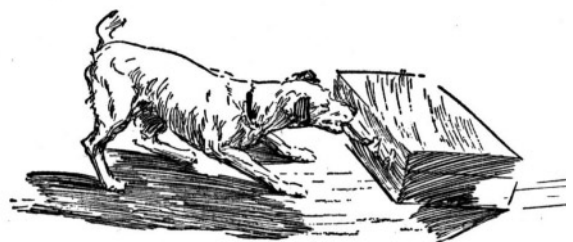

Notes from afar:

Greetings, all! Chris, Kira, Minnow, and I have been in the Seattle area since mid-June, getting a few things done on the boat. Our trip down from Juneau was lots of fun but we found ourselves wanting even MORE time to explore! The girls love living aboard the boat and traveling with us.

Seattle has been less interesting for them, but we have had a few great doggie moments. Here at Shilshole Bay Marina, we're only minutes from the closest leash-free area. Minnow loves to run around on the edges of large groups of dogs, but Kira doesn't care much for these relatively small areas (about an acre fenced). However, we quickly discovered the Cadillac of dogparks in the Seattle area – Marymoor Park. A couple of times a week, we've been making the trek across the 520 bridge (yikes!) over Lake Washington to Marymoor Park. This is a large (500 acre+) park with about 44 acres fenced with split rail and designated for off-leash dog use. It has fields for running, tracking, and training and a mile-long walk along the river with five areas for swimming. Each entrance to the off-leash area has a sign that says, "Expect to come upon dogs running free under voice control of their owners. If you are uncomfortable in the presence of unleashed dogs, maybe you could go somewhere else". It's a marvelous park, well-supplied with bags, trash cans, and volunteer caretakers. I highly recommend a visit if you're in Seattle with your dog.

On the brag end of things, Kira and I finished a Delta Society "Pet Partners" certification for animal-assisted activities and therapy. We've made a couple of visits to assisted-living facilities in the area. Laurie Hardman, the Delta evaluator in the area, has three PWDs. Her male, Rio, was one of the "neutral dogs" in the test, and there was another PWD undergoing evaluation as well. We're doing a driving trip to LA in late July, so Kira and Minnow will be staying with Laurie and her gang while we're gone.

In mid-August we'll be heading down the coast to San Francisco and San Diego. Once we're underway, we'll once again be updating our web log. You can find the "blog" and pictures, etc. at our website: www.legacysailing.com.

- All entries must be submitted on the official "UKC Entry Form".
- You may use one entry form to enter the same dog in more than one event on the same weekend.
- Use separate entry form for each dog to be entered in a club's event.
- Dog not UKC registered? Apply for a Temporary Listing Number (TL) online at <https://host.securelook.com/uksec/tlapp.html>. TL numbers are valid for 60 days - fee \$12.00. (Fees are non-transferable and do not apply to the cost of permanent registration.)
- Mail all completed entry forms to the Event Secretary listed under the event; unless otherwise specified.
- Make all fees payable to the host club.
- Obedience Trials, Agility Trials and Weight Pull events are open to all UKC recognized breeds and mixed bred dogs with a valid Limited Privilege number.
- Obedience only: Check the box provided to request either the Veteran or Special Jump height option. Veteran dogs must be 8 years or older. Eligible dogs for Special Jump Height are outlined in the current rules and regulations.

We want you to keep the points earned at licensed UKC events.

Important things to remember

- All dogs entering UKC events must be permanently registered, have a valid Temporary Listing Number, or a Limited Privilege number for performance events.
- All entry forms must be complete and signed. Incorrect information submitted on the entry form may invalidate your wins.
- To be eligible to enter into the Breeder/Handler class, you must be one of the breeders of record, or a member of the immediate family of one of the breeders of record. Immediate family includes: spouse, parent, step-parent, child, step-child, brother or sister.

All events are held under the Official Rules and Regulations of the United Kennel Club, Inc. Absolutely no alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs will be allowed on the grounds or in the buildings on the day of a UKC-licensed event. UKC, its agents and employees, and the host club assume no responsibility for any loss, damage, or injury sustained by spectators or by exhibitors and handlers, or to any of their dogs or property, and further assume no responsibility for injury to children not under the control of their parents or guardians. UKC and the host club are not responsible for loss, accidents or theft. By signing this form, I hereby agree to waive any claim, action, or lawsuit and further agree to indemnify and hold UKC, the host club and any approved UKC Judge harmless from any claims, actions or lawsuits resulting from my participation in this event, and any action, decision or judgment made by any UKC or host club representative or approved Judge under the official UKC Rules and Regulations governing this event. In May, a justice court jury in Deer Lodge County convicted the Alaska couple of 180 counts each of misdemeanor animal cruelty. It was their second trial on the charges, after the first ended in a hung jury.

The Harmans were arrested Nov. 1 at the Port of Sweet Grass after U.S. Customs inspectors discovered 170 dogs, mostly collies, and 10 cats dehydrated, emaciated, diseased and shivering in a tractor-trailer.

The Harmans were moving their dog kennel to Arizona and had transported the animals 2,240 miles over nine days.

The collies rescued from the Harmans' 18-wheeler are being kept at a warehouse in Great Falls and are in the process of being adopted out to new homes. 🐕

Part One

Cheryl May's Quick Fixes for Obedience Scores

Note from the author: I first prepared this as a handout for a workshop I did for a group of advanced 4-H dog handlers.

Successful obedience showing is the result of many hours of solid work with your dog. But there are a few things you can quickly fix that will help you get better scores. These include improving footwork; fixing handler errors; and decreasing your own nervousness in the ring.

How to improve heeling

Be consistent. Keep moving. Stay out of the way of your dog. You are the team leader and must give timely and correct signals to the dog. Practice correct footwork without the dog. Then, when you are working with your dog, your improved footwork will come naturally. Correct footwork gives the dog a better chance to be right because he "sees" a signal before the change of direction. There are several methods that work very effectively. The important thing is to select one method that works well for you and your dog and stick with it for now. Some modifications might need to be made as you and your dog progress in the training process due to how fast the dog works and the size of your dog. Practice walking in a straight line by walking on lines in a parking lot, or lining yourself up with floor tiles in a long hallway.

The first step of heeling

Starting on the left leg: Probably best for the slower or less attentive dog.

Starting on the right leg: Probably best for the fast, ready to go dog. This start has a tendency to keep the dog in more of a straight line when beginning to heel and avoids a bump on the first step.

Modifications: The length of the first step of heeling depends on how fast the dog works and the size of the dog. Don't leave your dog behind because you took too big a step!

Halts

Feet: It is best to teach the dog to stop whether you plant the left foot and bring the right foot up or vice versa. (Note: the "plant" of the foot should be a soft one.) The length of the last step as you plant your foot depends on the size and speed of your dog.

The signal: What happens naturally when you stop walking? If you are clipping along in a hurry to get somewhere and must suddenly come to a halt, your upper body leans back just before you stop. In training, exaggerate the lean as you plant your foot so your dog "sees" a definite signal before you stop. As time goes on, drop the exaggeration and just have the slight natural lean.

Change of pace

Just as in the halt where there is a natural backward lean to slow your forward motion and change your center of balance in order

to change to a slower pace, so too is there an opposite natural lean in order to speed up. When you start to go faster, there is a natural forward lean to change your center of balance and collect yourself as you move out briskly. Exaggerate these leans in practice. Then gradually wean the dog off the exaggeration to the natural.

Left and right turns

Round off your corners slightly. Rounded corners are much more smooth and natural looking than military style 90-degree turns.

You can signal the turn on either your left or right foot by swiveling your foot slightly before you actually begin the turn. Practice both because sometimes the dog will dictate which signal works best for your specific team.

Keep in mind that you must signal the dog before you actually turn, so you must initiate the turn in a straight line, then turn. Shorten your stride slightly through the turn and gradually move back to a normal pace.

The dynamics of this exercise dictate the footwork. You must maintain a consistent pace and distance around each post. Your dog should do the work changing pace - not you. There are things you can do to help your dog: Make sure you walk a straight line through the middle of the figure eight. In training, teach your dog "easy" and "hurry." Exaggerate these speeds in your training session so your dog learns and understands the pace changes he will have to make.

About turn

This is the most difficult turn to execute well. You must be able to maintain your consistent pace through the turn while staying out of the way of the dog. Teach this exercise by luring the dog around the turn with a treat. Treat when he reaches heel position, if he has executed the turn quickly and accurately. Make a game of it. A very fast turn earns the dog a bite of cheese or liver. A good turn earns the dog a bite of kibble. A slow turn earns nothing. You might say, "too slow, too bad." I do not believe that corrections or pulling the dog around the turn are effective in speeding up about turns. Keep training positive and make it fun for your dog. 🐾

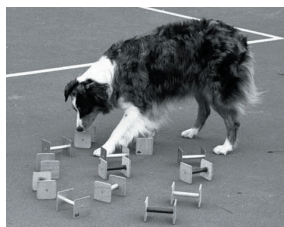
