**CKCoJ Monthly Board Meeting**  
**Juneau Library**  
**January 17, 2008**  
**6:30 pm**

Members present: Pam Nelson, George Utermohle, Vicky McLaughlin, Camille Stephens and Susan Hoffman.

I. Call to order at 6:35 by Pam Nelson, quorum achieved.

II. Consent Agenda

- a. Approval of agenda with the additions of e. Obedience Program Development under Discussion. And a. Obedience Trial proposal for June '08 under Action Items.
- b. Approval of minute for December 20, 2007 Board Meeting. Correction item II. d. Martina Miller instead of Marina Miller. So noted.
- c. Acceptance of the Treasurer's Report was unanimous.
- d. Approval of New Members. A Family membership for Brad and Donna Pierce was approved without objection. They have an 11 week old puppy, Zoey.

III. Discussion Items

a. Voting Procedures

Vicky asked the club to review their voting procedures, to look at the possibility of the board having the vote. She cited examples of other boards (City Assembly, Harbor Board, School Board, etc). She asked that the discussion item be listed until August, allowing enough time for every member to attend a board meeting and give input on the topic.

Everyone present spoke about the topic.

Susan – The vote for 5 individuals to vote for the whole club becomes a dictatorship.

Camille-This is too small of a club to take the vote away from the membership.

Susan- Members would have no say or input. They would not come to meetings.

Vicky- Members can give input, the model would follow the practices of established, operating boards.

Susan – We should just vote using Yahoo groups, then membership would have more of a say, other than having 5 people vote for the club.

Camille- That would foster more involvement and turn 180 degrees from what is occurring now. We are a small group, non-profit, small budget. We are not operating under a complete citizenship like the City Assembly.

George-We are incorporated, and we have a Board of Directors. All is set up for governance of the club. I have not seen a board set up to operate as our board, and I have seen many boards. It is disempowered. Every board I have seen is set up with the governance ability. The board is set up with for the maintenance of the organization regardless of whether or not the members attend the meetings. The board should be the decision making body of an organization following their obligations as board members.

Camille-This board has gotten away from the mission of the club. The board in the last few years has gotten away from listening to the members. We are a minority.

Susan-We had a vote to separate the annual meeting from the potluck. I was against it. Five members sent in notice against it. They were not listened to. The board is not listening to members.

Its just a democracy working (the club). There are some things our board members do that effect business.

Anything effecting membership goes out to vote. It needs to be a membership vote. Majority rules. You are trying to make club members apathetic. Its going to be bad. There is anger and animosity because of things that have gone through.

Camille-So, get on the board and be a dictator.

Pam- This is a discussion item.

Susan- How are you going to make this happen?

Pam-It will go to the Annual Meeting. Between now and then, it is a long enough period to hear input and reflect. Information will go out to the general membership. They will have the vote at the Annual Meeting.

Camille-How will this improve the club?

George-We are talking about a change of governance. We are talking about having a board of relevant decision makers.

Camille-Isn't it now?

George-We have had situations of mob rule. Nothing is consistent. When members get excited or agitated, they participate. What exists is the inability of the board to be effective decision makers. Numbers are not a clear representation of democracy.

Susan-We have shakers and movers in this club that are a majority that do everything. You have others that sit back and do nothing and show up for an event. If the board members are ruling against shakers and movers then it would hurt the club.

Camille-We see this as a move to split the club and assets.

George-I don't think so. We are here to help the organization of the club to continue working.

Susan-I sat on the board for 8 years. I'm not on the board now. I teach classes and put on events. There are board members doing similar things.

George-We agree we have members that do things. The board is not the person running the class, events, we are responsible for the business of governance.

Camille-From my perspective, we should be working toward a common goal. Five people cannot do the whole thing. I would not accept a board that has the only vote. Because its low, it does not mean they should have a right to make the whole vote.

Susan-I do a lot of things. Why shouldn't my vote count? Why should I come?

Pam-Some members can go back and forth on this issue. I can see the difficulty of not being on the board and not having a vote. Having been on the boards of two non-profit organizations, neither of which had the membership vote at the board meeting, I don't see it taking away membership voice. Members are able to come to the board and share opinions. It is not a power struggle for control. The purpose of being a board member is to vote. To listen to members present their opinions and vote. As it stands now, the entire membership does NOT come every month and vote. The purpose of this discussion item is to put it out there for members to discuss.

Susan-When something is on the agenda for or against- the current board members have decided before the meetings. The five members are voting in a block. We cannot out vote the board. You are changing it so no one can vote down the board. I feel decisions are being made before board meetings. We and come and feel out voted. It is not fair.

Pam-We need to encourage other to participate and to be heard. This will go out to be decided by members. We want it to go out and attain input form membership to allow the vote and final decision to be made at the Annual Meeting.

Camille-Think better about what you do at the Annual Meeting. Keep true to the club's mission. The board is drifting from the values of the club. You need to stay true to the club.

Susan-You are taking away from the membership. The board will have an increase in duties tenfold. The five people will be working on everything. You will have to bring a lot to the membership at the Annual Meeting.

George- This is the strangest board I've ever seen. It has unusual corporate arrangements.

Camille-If it works, why change it? It's a club. We incorporated for the non-profit status. We need to cooperate. This is dysfunctional.

b. Code of Conduct-Vicky handed out a rough draft for everyone to review. She wanted to make an effort to establish a code of conduct since one did not exist for the club. It was agreed to put the draft as a working document into the next newsletter. Responses/comments/suggestions would come to the board and be included as Public Record. Comments will be collected by Pam and brought to the next monthly board meeting as a discussion item.

c. Donation Guidelines-Vicky brought forth a draft document on donations. Those present agreed to hold over for next month as a discussion item.

d. Senior Membership-Vicky raised the question since we are a non-profit club, should we offer a senior membership? Much discussion about whether many seniors participate or would participate. Off shoot

discussion about offering classes by lottery to people adopting dogs at GHS. Scholarships were mentioned. What constitutes a senior – 65 or 70? What is the criteria? George mentioned memberships are cheaper than giving away classes.

e. Obedience Program Development - Camille shared about building more of an interest in obedience. She and others want to offer more activities around obedience to assist others in being successful. Some ideas tossed out were – Host some Show and Go on Saturdays. Open format for club members and the public, all levels. Patti, Susan and Camille are will to assist. The income would help offset cost for obedience trials. Another opportunity would be open practices under the covered playgrounds and on the grass at Floyd Dryden. Hopefully, there will be workshops in the future with Patti. The goal is to improve performance for handling teams and to sustain interest.

#### IV. Action Items

- a. Obedience Trial proposal for June 08- Camille proposed an obedience trial for the first weekend in June. Patti would be the judge. Expenses were not as much as bringing a trial judge up from down south. Motion to approve was made by Vicky, George seconded. All were in approval.

#### V. Routine Updates

- a. Camille will have a complete obedience premium on the website very soon. Rally O premium is up on the website. Registration for Level 1 and Level 2 classes will be up on the website soon. George mentioned it was a full calendar with many events listed.
- b. Committee Reports- None
- c. Correspondence- George shared the mail from the club post office box (mostly junk). Pam took the CBJ field request reservation to give to Jill for agility bookings. Pam brought a correspondence directed to the board from member, Marty Messick. Marty asked about a member having the right to cancel another members class or function? The organizer is responsible for the event. What was needed was clear communication. Pam will email Marty a response to her question.

## Capital Kennel Club of Juneau Donation Guidelines

The Capital Kennel Club of Juneau recognizes the benefit of donating to worthy non-profit organizations in need of supporting dogs.

Appeals for donations will be approved on a first come, first serve basis. All appeals should be in a written format, including information about the recipient. All appeals made to the board should be done in person. Donations will be considered under Discussion on the agenda.

Donations (plural) will not exceed 10% of the club income for the year, nor will any be granted if the club balance will fall below \$7500.00 as the result of donation requests. Within the year, any number of requests will be reviewed and approved by the board.

The board will determine whether the donation is to be granted. The priority for donations will be:

1. Local level (within the City and Borough of Juneau) credible, certified non-profit causes/groups dedicated to dogs.
2. State level (within the state of Alaska) credible, certified non-profit causes/groups dedicated to dogs.
3. National level (within the United States of America) credible, certified non-profit causes/groups dedicated to dogs.

The board is solely responsible for granting a request for a donation and will take into consideration the financial condition of the club.

# **Capital Kennel Club of Juneau Code of Conduct**

The Code of Conduct consists of principles, values, standards and rules of behavior that guide decisions, procedures and practices for members of the Capital Kennel Club of Juneau.

## **Member of Good Standing**

A Member of Good Standing is defined as someone who follows the guidelines, the constitutions and by laws, and policies established by club.

A Member of Good Standing contributes to the well being of the club by their volunteerism, participation in club events, attitude, and their collegiality.

A Member of Good Standing always conducts himself/herself in a positive manner that will reflect credit upon himself/herself, his/her dog, the club and the sport regardless of the location or circumstance.

## **Membership Privileges**

Club membership includes the opportunity to participate in classes, seminars, practices, various performance trials and other club activities. A member may receive Doggie Dollars as a reward for volunteering. Doggie Dollars may be redeemed by individuals to assist in paying for club activities for which they choose to participate.

## **Membership Etiquette**

All members shall contribute to the welfare of the club. No one individual is a sole spokesman for the club nor higher in status than any other member of the club. All members shall contribute to the "Good of the Club." All members are to put the best interest of the club ahead of self-interest. All club members are to be positive when interacting with other members in person and on line (emails, announcements and the newsletter). All club members will practice honesty and fairness in all transactions with members of the club. The use of equipment is for club activities, not for personal use. All members will use positive training methods when training their dogs.

# **Discipline**

Any member who is suspended from the privileges of NADAC, UKC, CKC, APDT and AKC shall be suspended from the privileges of this club for the corresponding period.



## **Charges**

An individual member may press charges against another individual member for alleged misconduct prejudicial to the best interests of the club. Written charges with specifications must be filed with the President. The President shall promptly send a copy of the charges to each board member or present them at a board meeting.

The board shall first consider whether the alleged charges, if proven, might constitute conduct prejudicial to the best interests of the club. If the board considers the charges do not allege conduct prejudicial to the best interest of the club, the board may refuse to entertain jurisdiction. If the board entertains jurisdiction of the charges, it shall fix a date for a hearing by the board no less than 3 weeks thereafter. The President shall send a copy of the charges and the specifications to the accused member with a notice of the hearing. The President shall assure the defendant that they may appear in his/her own defense.

## **Board Hearing**

The board shall invite the complainant and defendant to the hearing. Both parties shall present their evidence and point of view. Each side will be treated uniformly by the board. After the evidence and testimony have been presented by the complainant and defendant and should the charges be sustained after the hearing, the board may by majority vote reprimand, censure or suspend the defendant from all privileges of the club. And, if the board deems that punishment is insufficient, the board may recommend to the membership that the penalty be expulsion. In such a case, the suspension shall not restrict the defendant's right to appear before his/her fellow members at the ensuing club meeting which considers the board's recommendation. After the board has reached a decision, its finding shall be put in written form and filed with the Secretary. The Secretary, in turn, shall notify each of the parties of the board's decision and penalty, if any.

## **Expulsion**

Expulsion of a member of the club may be accomplished only at a meeting of the club following a board hearing. The defendant shall have the right to appear on his/her own behalf, though no evidence will be taken at this meeting. The President shall read the charges and the board's finding and recommendation. And the President shall invite the defendant, if present, to speak on his/her behalf. The members shall vote by secret ballot on the proposed expulsion. A two-thirds vote of those present at the meeting shall be necessary for expulsion. If the expulsion is not so voted, the board's suspension shall stand.

## Off The Shelf... by Pat Kalbaugh

DVD Review: *“Fighting Dominance In A Dog Whispering World”* by Jean Donaldson & Ian Dunbar  
Or

*The science and mythology of dominance theories, because the real world doesn't have a cutting room floor.*

Anyone who has watched the National Geographic Channel's show, "The Dog Whisperer" has probably heard Cesar Millan preach that the owner must be dominant over the dog to achieve "balance" within the dog and the pack. While I think that Cesar has some great thoughts on how our "energy" ("emotion") communicates weakness or strength to our dogs and he shares some really good, practical advice about dogs and dog training, I sometimes feel uncomfortable with his methods. Up to now, I didn't really know exactly why because it looks so good and works so well on TV. That is exactly the problem...it's a TV show and we only see part of the whole or, more precisely, what the producers *want* us to see and believe.

Enter two of the world's leading dog trainers/behaviorists, Jean Donaldson (*Culture Clash, Dogs Are From Neptune*) and Ian Dunbar (Veterinarian, founder of the first puppy training classes in this country (Sirius Puppy Training), founder of the Association of Pet Dog Trainers (APDT) and author of many books and videos) teaming up to offer a scientific approach on the myths "dominance" training theory.

No matter which side of the fence you're on in this debate, this 4-hour DVD, directed mainly at dog trainers who run pet dog training classes, raises some interesting points of view with scientific studies to back up the assertions. Donaldson sounds slightly militant at times especially when she talks about protecting trainers from leaving the industry due to burn out and protecting dogs from inhumane training methods. Dunbar's approach is friendlier, salted with typical British humor and even a few "tricks" to help instructors work with people in their classes. But their messages are very similar. Both question the reality TV dog training show's effectiveness over the long haul, they debunk "dominance" theory using scientific evidence and give their opinions on where they feel the line is drawn between humane and inhumane methods in the field of dog training.

In this two-disc DVD set, Donaldson and Dunbar lecture separately for almost two hours each on the main topic *“Fighting Dominance in a Dog Whispering World”*. Almost another hour is spent in a panel-like setting with both Donaldson and Dunbar fielding questions from the audience. There are some good laughs as well as thought provoking material, new ideas and facts backed up by scientific studies that are well presented by these two scientists/dog trainers/behaviorists/authors. If you're not up for watching four hours straight, the DVD is set up so you can watch Donaldson's presentation separately from Dunbar's and the question and answer panel in a third sitting. I recommend watching Dunbar first as I think he is a more charismatic and humorous speaker than Donaldson's dry scientific approach.

Even though this is a controversial subject, there are some things that are agreed upon by both camps. Dogs need exercise, structure, consistency and training or they will become obnoxious, even unsafe and impossible to live with. The reasons behind why this happens may differ but the ultimate result we all want, a nicely behaved dog, is similar. Only the means by which it is achieved, if it can be achieved at all, differ. Donaldson and Dunbar question this because it is, after all, TV, not real life. However, they also raise the bar on what constitutes a well-behaved dog, challenging even the most

anal of us to train our dogs to the highest standard possible --100% compliance, 100% of the time-- by using only sound scientifically proven positive reinforcement methods and using them correctly and humanely. Unfortunately, most people cannot or will not spend the time and energy required to achieve this high standard. Donaldson and Dunbar assert that Millan's methods are not backed up by science, only controversial theory regarding dog pack behavior. Both Donaldson and Dunbar offer scientifically sound ways to measure whether the training is effective, Millan does not. Donaldson and Dunbar use only positive reinforcement methods where Millan uses some force and domination "energy" to achieve a similar result.

While it may sound like I am not a big fan of Cesar's show, rest assured I watch him on a fairly regular basis. I like some of his ideas and some can be easily adapted to a positive reinforcement training scenario. Millan's brilliant "***no touch, no talk, no eye contact.***" rule when dealing with questionable dogs should be followed by **all** of us and **we should teach this rule to every child for every dog they meet if only for safety reasons.** This is a great message to get out to the general public and TV reaches a large audience. I believe and I think that Donaldson and Dunbar would also agree, that many owners are too permissive with their dogs. They do not set boundaries and limitations which are the hallmarks of Millan's method. Positive should not be equated with permissive. Cesar advocates for the owner to be firmly in control, setting boundaries and using discipline to put the dog in a more comfortable subordinate position. I agree. Millan advocates, and I agree, that exercise and training will keep the dog mentally stimulated and physically tired and that dog is much less likely to misbehave. The other plus that both Cesar, Donaldson and Dunbar advocate, is spending time interacting builds the relationship that helps achieve mutual respect between dog and owner. I also like to ponder how I would approach this problem if it were my dog and try to figure out how the dog got into this position in the first place.

However, Dunbar and Donaldson draw the line at using pain and fear (heavy leash corrections, choke, chain, prong collars and physical domination) to train dogs. They feel, and I agree, that it can be super dangerous to advocate those types of methods on a TV show. These methods can result in increasing fear (fear biting) and dog-to-human aggression in some dogs especially when implemented by unskilled, or loose tempered owners. That is a recipe for disaster to the dog that will surely be euthanized if he ultimately bites someone. Donaldson and Dunbar take on this subject and offer sound advice and rhetoric to use if instructors encounter someone using these methods abusively.

I highly recommend this DVD if you are interested in learning the science behind dog training, if you watch the TV show regularly or instruct classes where you might be asked questions on this topic. It's good to know as much as you can about this controversial subject. There are also many training tips offered by Dunbar for those of us who crave new ways of doing "it". Also, Donaldson's and Dunbar's favorite dog training titles (by other authors) are discussed.

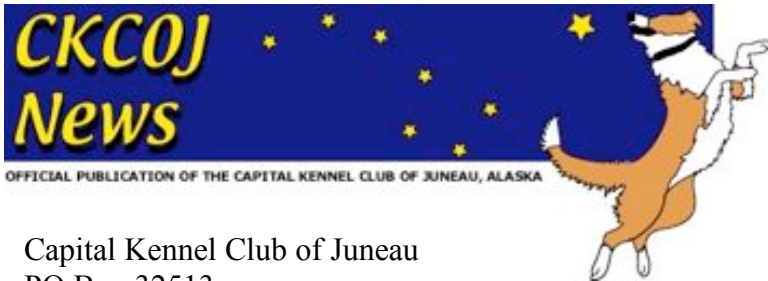
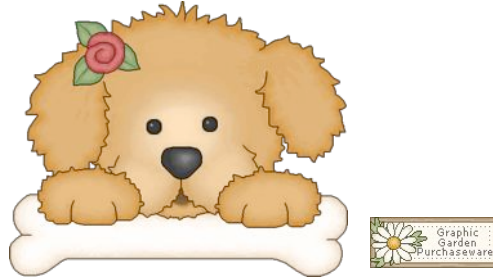
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
